These episodes form the picaresque narrative arc for the novel's reflective, comic and satiric themes. To wit: the prideful professorial ego and its flipside of guilt, the learned stupidity of academe versus the "unschooled" wisdom of Zen, and the stunning absurdity of so many mores and rituals of academic life (this latter the overripe fruit of the author's forty years at the university.)
